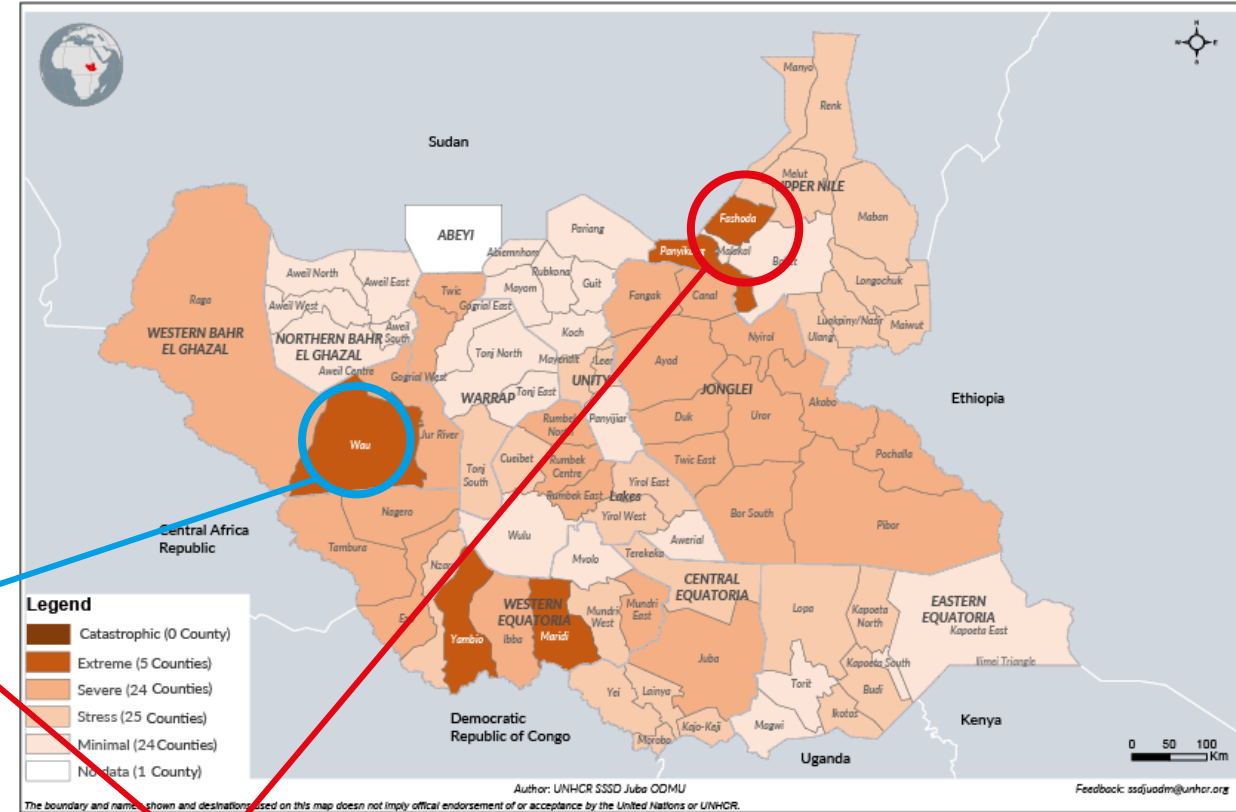
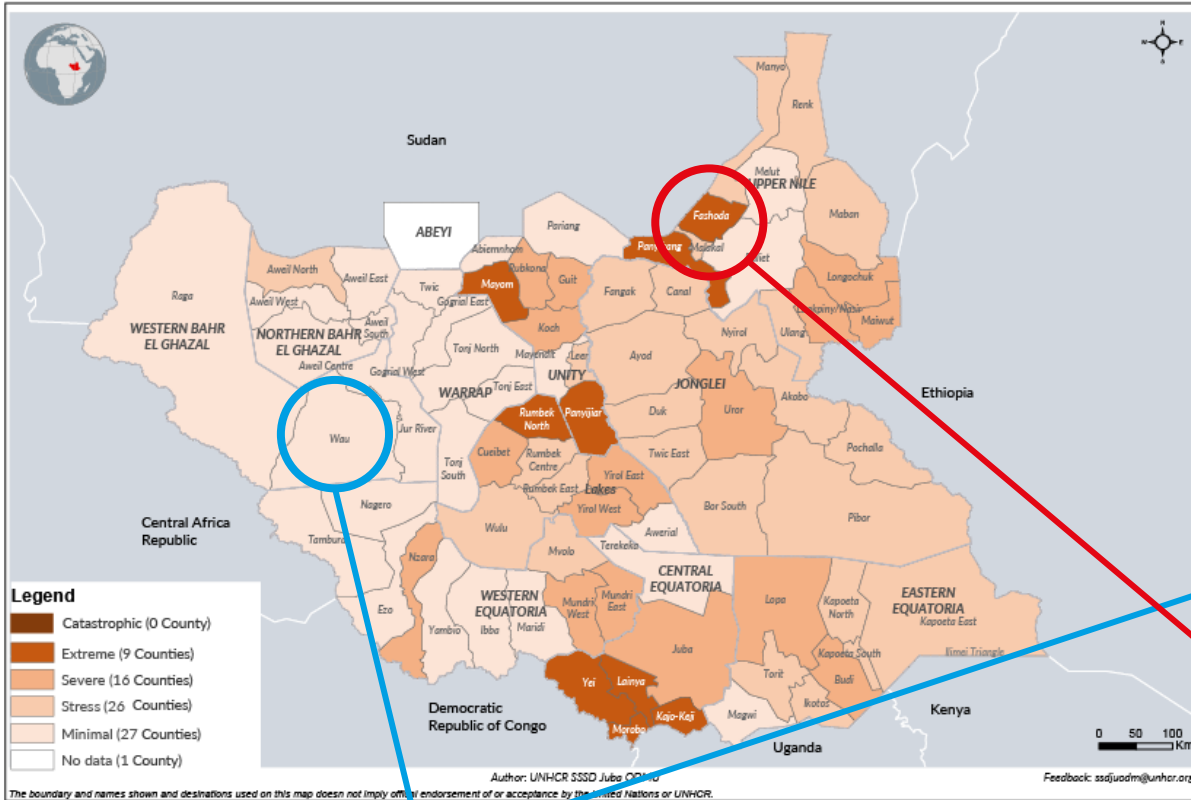
2024 TIMELINE HNO & HRP ANALYSIS AND PLANNING STEPS

Identify areas that specific response

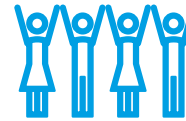
Identify areas that are priority for multiple response.

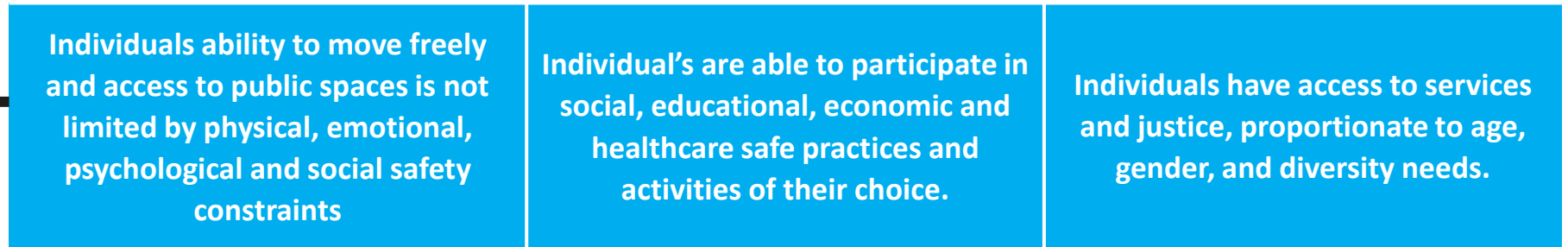

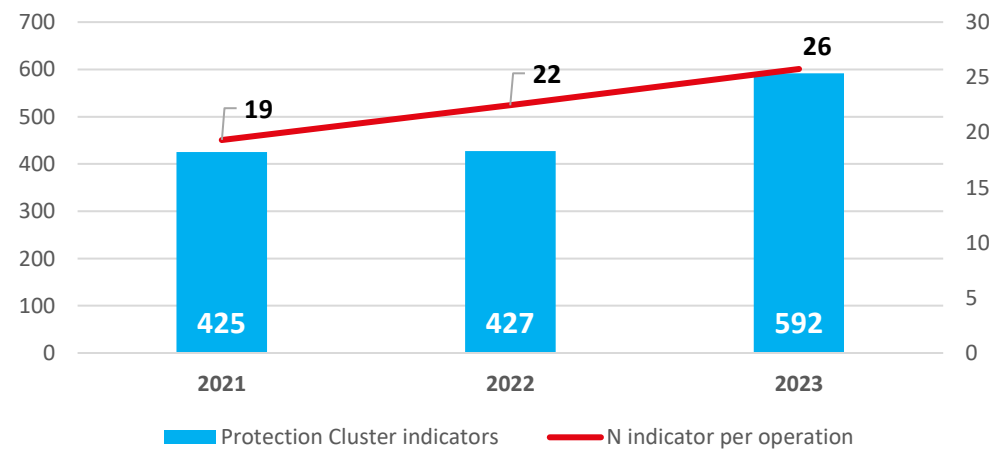
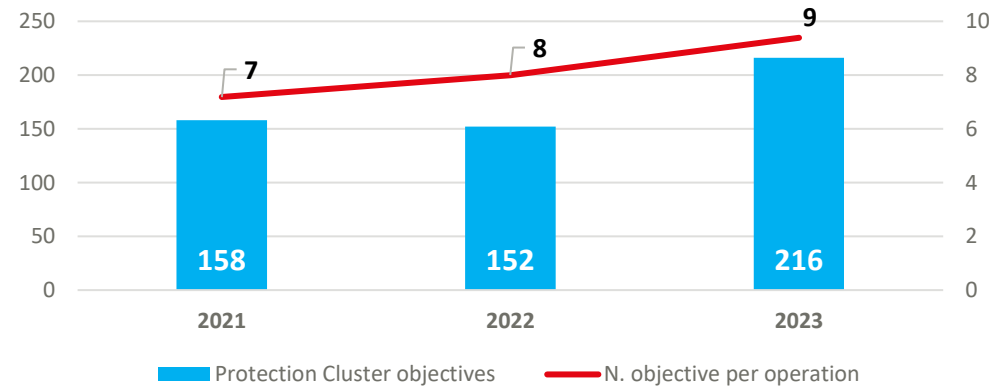

Defining Protection Objectives for the HRP Response Plan

- What are the most critical protection risks driving the humanitarian crisis?
- What are the protection risks that require an immediate response by the protection actors?
- Consider the analysis of these risks – what/who is causing the threat, who is vulnerable to the threat, what capacities exists to mitigate/reduce the risk?



Defining the objectives for the Protection response plan

- What is required to reduce/ mitigate the identified protection risks?
- Can we formulate objectives around these actions?
- Examples (NWS, Yemen,...)
- Protection response framework



PC Strategic Framework Nort West Syria

Objectives:

- Enhance **community-based capacity** to prevent and mitigate protection risks in an **inclusive** manner in at-heightened risk areas.
- Strengthened and tailored **protection services** and mechanisms to most affected population groups and communities guaranteeing **inclusiveness**.
- Improved **protection environment** to promote **peaceful coexistence and social cohesion** promoting self-reliance, inclusion, and governance.



HRP Protection Cluster Response Plan Yemen

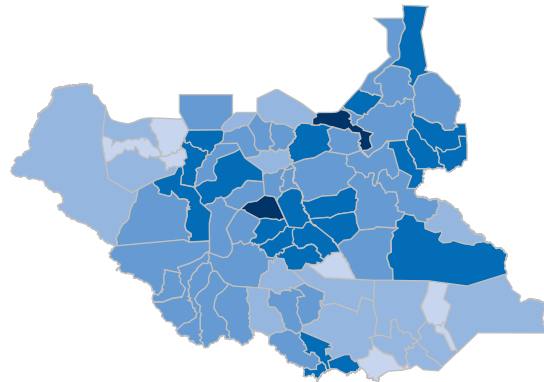
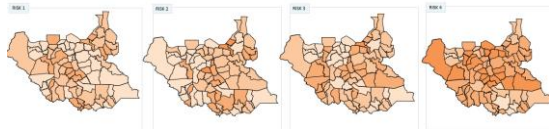
Objectives:

- Ensure vulnerable IDPs, non-displaced people and returnees receive principled and gender-**responsive protection assistance**.
- Vulnerable IDPs, non-displaced people and returnees benefit from full, **equitable, and non-discriminatory access to essential services** and enjoyment of their legal and human rights.
- Improve the **resilience and social cohesion** of conflict-affected communities; persons of concern are supported in identifying **sustainable solutions**.



Enablers

SAFETY

Individual's physical, emotional, psychological, and social safety, is not discriminated based on personal conditions or characteristics.



PARTICIPATION

Individual's are able to engage in safe practices, including participation in social, educational, and economic activities of their choice.



ACCESS TO SERVICES

Individuals have access to services and justice, proportionate to age, gender, and diversity needs.

Response Framework

CORE PROGRAMMING MODALITIES

Populations receive necessary short-term, life-saving assistance and sensitive protection services.

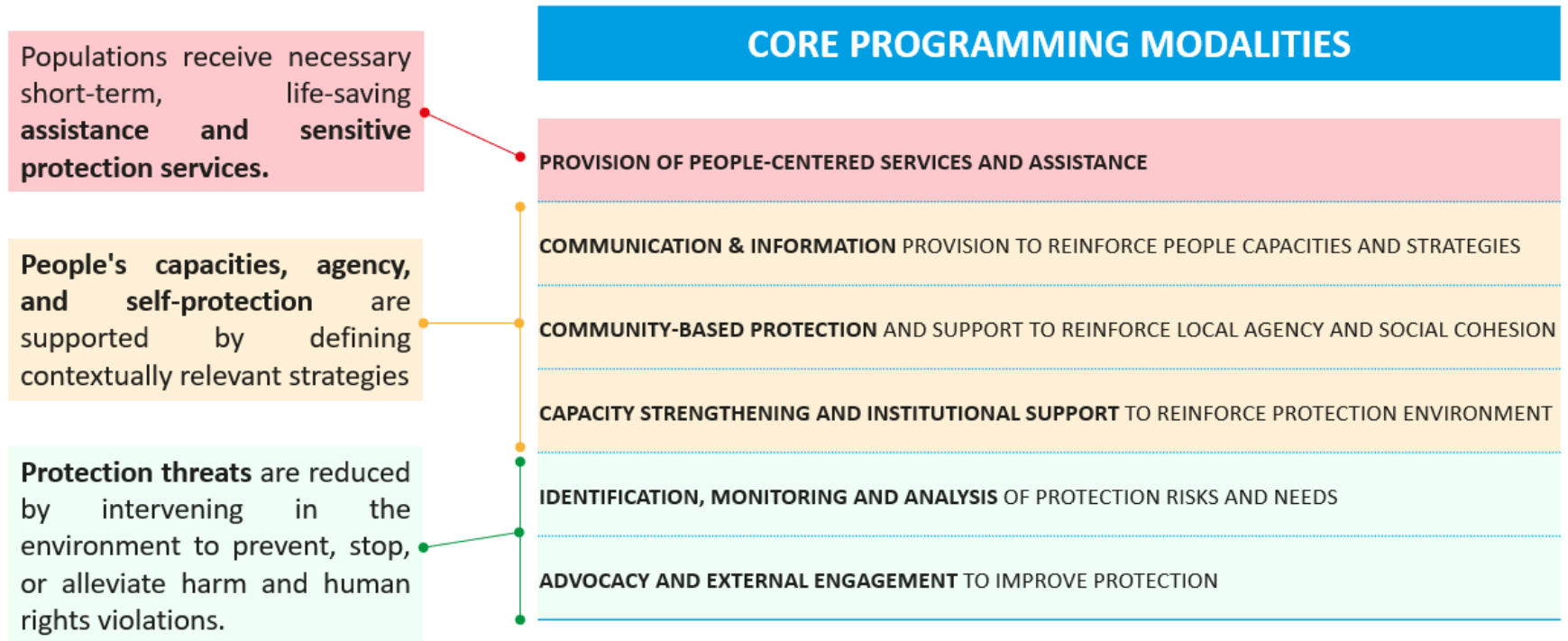
People's capacities, agency, and self-protection are supported by defining contextually relevant strategies

Protection threats are reduced by intervening in the environment to prevent, stop, or alleviate harm and human rights violations.

- PROVISION OF PEOPLE-CENTERED SERVICES AND ASSISTANCE
- COMMUNICATION & INFORMATION PROVISION TO REINFORCE PEOPLE CAPACITIES AND STRATEGIES
- COMMUNITY-BASED PROTECTION AND SUPPORT TO REINFORCE LOCAL AGENCY AND SOCIAL COHESION
- CAPACITY STRENGTHENING AND INSTITUTIONAL SUPPORT TO REINFORCE PROTECTION ENVIRONMENT
- IDENTIFICATION, MONITORING AND ANALYSIS OF PROTECTION RISKS AND NEEDS
- ADVOCACY AND EXTERNAL ENGAGEMENT TO IMPROVE PROTECTION

ORIGINAL FORMULATION

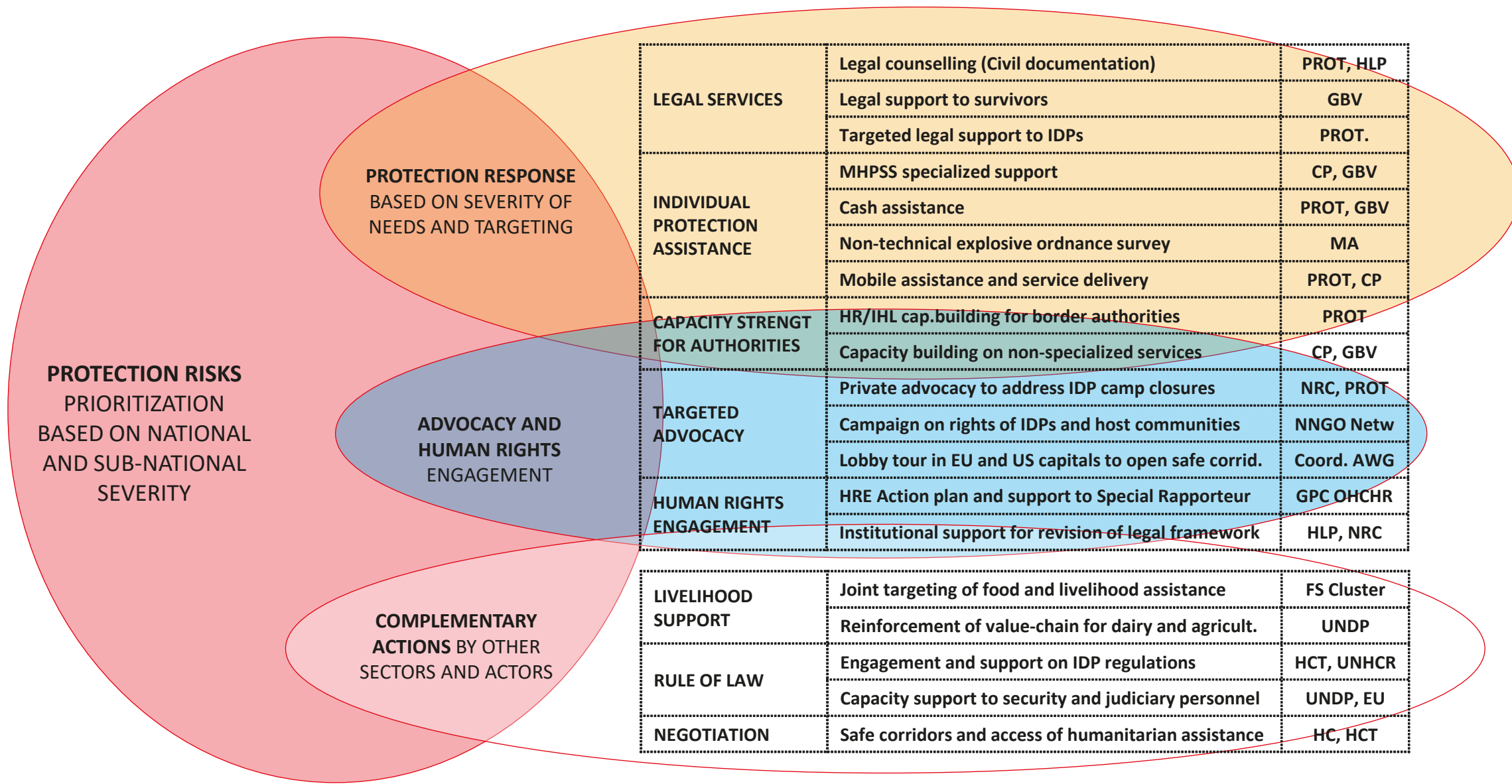
Provide lifesaving and life-sustaining assistance to the people most affected by the drought through integrated humanitarian interventions.



EXAMPLE

Provide lifesaving and life-sustaining assistance, and **reinforce people capacities, strategy, local agency and social cohesion** of the people most affected by drought.

HRP Strategic Objectives on Protection

- What are the protection risks that require collective action?
- Consider what is included in the HCT protection strategy (if there is one)
- Consider how other sectors/clusters can contribute to the objective
- Be concrete about the protection risks that will be addressed



Examples of HRP Strategic Objectives on Protection

- **Protection risks and needs are identified**, monitored, mitigated, and met for 3 million people, while the centrality of protection is upheld across the humanitarian response including through **promotion of respect for human rights, international humanitarian law and humanitarian principles**.
- **Address the protection risks and needs** of affected people - women and girls, men and boys - with the aim of safeguarding their dignity while **strengthening the protection environment** in Mozambique through collective and multi-sectoral action in line with commitments to gender equality principles, the centrality of protection, and PSEA across the humanitarian response.
- Uphold commitments to collective action to **address critical protection risks** by reducing the **risks of exclusion**, the **risks associated with displacement**, and **indiscriminate attacks on civilians** and their objects for all 7.6 million people targeted.
